#### MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT

A number of strategic priorities informed the board's activities this year. In the fall we held a listening session with Gabriel George of the

Tsleil-waututh Nation to begin to understand how our role as place makers and good neighbors needs to be informed through a reconciliation lens. This lens is important given that our organization and properties exist on unceded traditional territory. We under took this work knowing that many of the neighbourhood houses and camp already provide programming in consideration of Indigenous concerns. The board however, is perhaps a step behind and eagerly catching up.

The other strategic priority that has required considerable attention over the last year is developing policy to inform and guide redevelopment projects for the organization. A number of ANHBC Executive Directors are forging ahead and laying the ground work for redevelopments opportunities on their sites. The board seeks to support and facilitate these activities with policies and tools that replicate success across the organization based on lessons learned most recently from the Kitsilano Neighbourhood House Redevelopment project.

Finally, we have initiated conversations and reviews on the roles and functions at the Community Board level of the organization. We appreciate that there is wide diversity and unique features to each Community Board supporting the Neighbourhood Houses and Camp, but we also have come to learn that there are developmental needs where the ANHBC Board can contribute. Our goal is as always, a stronger, diverse and vibrant organization.

Building partnerships with municipal and provincial organizations, service groups, private donors, and corporate supporters is a key advocacy role that ANHBC plays. Over the last year we have found our provincial government is considerably more responsive to hearing from and about the BC Neighbourhood House movement and I'd like to thank Deb and her group of executive directors for ensuring that Neighbourhood Houses outside the umbrella of ANHBC are involved in the conversation.

Like many volunteer boards our membership will change this year and I would personally like to thank ANHBC Board members stepping down who with good humor and generosity have contributed their time and professional expertise to support ANHBC in its evolving role as a leader in the Neighbourhood House movement.

ANHBC has passed into history, where we've seen an 8% growth in budget, steadily growing programs and services. This year we have focused on some specific areas for development.

For this short report, I'll focus on one notable area — services to children and youth. Ensuring a good start for children and a positive community environment for families is critical to our mission. ANHBC has over 1,100 licensed childcare spaces across the region, and we host 1,500 young campers at Sasamat every year. Thanks to the hard work of some key staff members, we've tuned up our administrative systems. We are excited to have been awarded the operation of two large new childcare centres by the City of Vancouver. Our Reggio-Inspired Learning Centre is now well-established at Frog Hollow. We continue to be a strong voice for and significant provider of childcare in the City of Surrey. We are eager to participate in the Province's vision for universal accessible care.


